Course Overview

Studying Law gives students an understanding of the role of Law in today's society and raises their awareness of the rights and responsibilities of individuals. By learning about legal rules and how and why they apply to real life, students also develop their analytical ability, decision making, critical thinking and problem-solving skills. All these skills are highly sought after by higher education and employers.

Apart from the obvious careers of solicitor or barrister, law students are well liked by industry, commerce and local government and can be found working in retail management, publishing, journalism, the police force, social services and teaching.

Entry Requirements

Students are required to have the standard Sixth Form entry requirements (five 5-9 Grades) plus English language at grade 6 or above. You do not need to have studied law at GCSE.
